#### Seasonal Apple Turnovers

Makes 16

Bake at 185° C for 15 minutes

#### Ingredients

A packet of puff pastry

2 apples (chopping into small pieces)

Sultanas (optional)

½ teaspoon of cinnamon

1-2 teaspoons of sugar

2 teaspoons of icing sugar (optional)

A little flour



#### Method

De-frost the pastry. Dust worktop with flour. Cut into four. Roll each quarter out, from this cut into four rolled out squares. Add chopped apple to one triangle of the square sprinkle with cinnamon and sugar. Add additional fruit or jam to the apples. Brush the edges with water. Fold over the other half to form a triangle. Press edges down lightly. Place on a greased baking try and bake until golden. Remove from the oven and allow to cool. Once cooled, you can dust with icing sugar or make up some icing and drizzle in lines over the turnovers.

## Make a Christmas Stocking



#### Materials

A piece of material e.g. old cushion cover, tablecloth, tea towel

Trim for the top – Use a different colour material

Scissors

Pencil or pen

Sewing thread

Sewing needle

Pins or pegs

A sock (as your template)

Embellishments e.g. buttons and ribbons

#### Method

Lay the sock in the middle of your folded piece of material (wrong side) and draw around sock. This will give you a guide. Using this outline, draw as big as you want all the way around.

Cut out shape and at this stage it is easier to add embellishments.

Join together leaving the top end open. Turn right side out. Add a trim at the top. Add a ribbon or loop so it can be hung up.

#### The Christmas Tree

The Christmas Tree was Introduced into England in the early 19th century. It was made popular by Queen Victoria and her husband Albert. The Victorian trees were decorated with toys and small gifts, candles, candies, popcorn strings, and fancy cakes hung from the branches by ribbons and by paper chains. #### **CARER'S TIPS**

A person living with dementia experiences the world differently and to help them, especially when they may have little or no speech, means we must listen and observe more carefully. Here are some examples:

My parents were religious and would say their prayers every night before going to sleep. Sadly, my Mum passed away three months before Dad so every night during this time, I would sit with him on the sofa, put a picture of Mum on the table and ask the question "Prayers?". Sometimes he would sit quietly and listen as I said prayers other times, he would join in with the odd word that he remembered. One evening I made a mistake in the middle of The Lord's Prayer and he laughed and gently tapped my hand as if to tell me off. It was joyful that he was with me in this moment and could still communicate in his way.

Often people with dementia are challenged by different colours and therefore, to them, similar colours can blend into each other. A dark rug may look like a hole in the floor and one gentleman I knew would not go into the bathroom if there was a rug on the floor. A pure white toilet seat can sometimes confuse people and I have seen where coloured seats and coloured handrails have been used in bathrooms to help people see the contrast.

Poor lighting can cause anxiety. Good lighting, especially as the days are shorter, helps people identify spaces, rooms, equipment and signs. Some people struggle when they see shadows in a room. I know my Dad always liked the door to the living room to be shut and if I didn't do this he would be constantly looking through the door and would become agitated and point to make sure I closed it.
